Besides relating the resettlement history of Japanese Americans, Erik compared the existing/historic buildings to those used in Naomi Hirahara's novel *Clark and Division*. Erik (far right in photo) and **Bob Kumak**i (at left in photo) helped Naomi learn about the people and places of resettlement-era Chicago for her well-received book.

This special tour was occasioned by the visit of USJC President & CEO **Audrey Yamamoto**. Everyone learned more about this era of Chicago Japanese American history from Erik's tour.

Osaka sent the first SSE delegation; that continued, with Chicago and Osaka sending delegations on alternate years until the exchanges were halted by the pandemic. This year, Chicago hosted the International Social Services Conference, held June 20 to June 22, 2024. This exchange brought together social service professionals from Chicago and eight sister cities - Casablanca, Durban, Galway, Hamburg, Kyiv, Paris, Shanghai, and Osaka. The conference, "Innovations in Social Services: Fostering Global Connections through New Ideas and Strategies," was focused on deepening cultural awareness, sharing best practices, expanding professional networks, and pushing forward initiatives that uplift human potential and well-being.
