#### Saira Chambers

As Director of the Japanese Culture Center and Executive Director of the Japanese Arts Foundation, Saira Chambers has been spearheading Japanese cultural programs, education, and arts across Chicagoland for over 15 years. Directing over 600 annual programs, workshops, exhibitions, and events, her organizations reach nearly 200,000 individuals annually who wish to learn more about Japan. Saira's work aspires to explore the art, history, and culture of Japan globally to bridge cultural competence and informed cross-cultural perspectives. She also serves as President of the Garden of the Phoenix Foundation, where she works to restore the historic Japanese garden from the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition.

Erik Matsunaga's investigations into the history of Chicago's Japanese American community have been featured by the Japanese American National Museum, WBEZ Radio, WGN News, Newberry Library, and others.

As a community historian, he established Windy City Nikkei to publish, present, and consult on topics ranging from WWII-Era Japanese American incarceration and resettlement to contemporary local issues, institutions, events, and personalities.

As a lifetime martial artist, in his spare time Erik operates Shobu Karatedo, a community-

based Okinawan Shorinryu karate dojo at Ravenswood Fellowship UMC. While not religiously affiliated with the church, RFUMC was co-founded by resettled Japanese Americans and shares their space with various cultural and community groups.

Erik and his wife of 18 years, Christine, have four children and reside on Chicago's North Side. Together they manage Budlong Group LLC, a commercial and residential real estate and management company.

Nolan Jimbo is a curator of contemporary art and writer based in Chicago. He is currently Assistant Curator at the Museum of Contemporary Art Chicago, where his forthcoming projects include the first solo museum exhibition and book dedicated to Kenzi Shiokava, as well as Yoko Ono: Music of the Mind, the artist's most comprehensive exhibition to date. Previously, he held curatorial positions at MASS MoCA, the Dallas Museum of Art, and the J. Paul Getty Museum. Born and raised in Los Angeles, Jimbo earned his MA from the Williams Graduate Program in the History of Art and his BA in art history, summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa, from Tufts University.

**Jean Fujiu** (the region's first JALD back in 2005, before there was a USJC) took part in *Kansha Too!*, coordinated by the JACL Chicago chapter. Participants explored the history of Japanese American WWII incarceration and its continued impact and ongoing legacy in the Japanese American community. The program included a tour of Little Tokyo in Los Angeles, a tour of the Japanese American National Museum (JANM) and a pilgrimage to the Manzanar National Historic Site. Jean said that at JANM, it was especially meaningful to see the *Ireicho* (book of names) and stamp by the names of her family that had been incarcerated, and how at Manzanar, a small staff and many volunteers turned a barren land into a beautiful Japanese garden.



The Japanese American Service Committee (JASC) is opening its new building at 5700 N. Lincoln Ave. in Chicago on December 12! USJC members involved in JASC include CEO **Michael Takada**, Board President **Stacy Uchida Brown**, and board members **Marion Friebus-Flaman**, **Bob Kumaki**, **Michael Tanimura**, **Meredith Maimoni**, **Andrea Sugano**, **Kaz Maniwa**, and **Stephanie Nitahara**.

The new facility will allow JASC to grow its adult day service offering, provide space for cultural activities and community engagement, and elevate its Legacy Center historical archives, which preserves and tells the story of Japanese American history and resettlement in Chicago.



### Teaching Teachers about Japanese American Resettlement

On July 23, Erik Matsunaga led a walking tour of Chicago's Historic Lakeview Japanese American community as part of Jason Matsumoto's Full Spectrum Features' National Endowment for the Humanities K-12 Institute, "Japanese American Post-War Resettlement in Chicago, 1943-1950." This 3-week, hybrid institute brought a nationwide cohort of educators to Chicago to engender a sense of living history through the connection of geography and stories told by local community members.


The tour was preceded by a classroom presentation at DePaul University, entitled

Guest speakers along the route included Chicagoans Dwight Sora, who spoke about the Illinois Aikido Club outside its early 1960s commercial space at 3223 N. Clark; and Ross Harano (below left), who discussed the Japanese American Service Committee at its former Viking Hall location on the corner of School and Sheffield Streets. Written statements about the old Hamburger King restaurant and growing up on nearby heavily-JA populated Newport Avenue were provided by Paul Yamauchi and the late Mary Okumura, respectively.

After the tour, the Full Spectrum crew treated institute participants to lunch at Rice'N Bread (below), formerly Tom Yamauchi's Hamburger King, where JA legacy dishes – such as the Akutagawa, Yet Ca Mein, and anything with rice and gravy, – are still on the menu.
